DISASTER ASSISTANCE

NDRRA/DRFA Grants Program

QRA administers and coordinates joint Commonwealth State disaster recovery grant measures in Queensland through Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) and Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).



Acquittal:

The State's next claim to the Commonwealth for DRFA is due by **31 March 2020**.

QRA is currently processing the close-out of completed works for the claim.

RECOVERY

QRA works extensively on recovery planning with councils impacted by major disaster events, increasing capability and awareness through active participation and providing support for local recovery governance.

Recovery Plans

QRA is currently coordinating 3 state event specific recovery plans:

Southern Queensland Bushfires (2020)

Functional Recovery Groups are completing recovery action plans for incorporation into the Recovery Plan. Noosa Shire and Scenic Rim Regional council are being assisted to develop event specific recovery plans by QRA. Southern Downs Regional Council has endorsed its event specific recovery plan.

North & FNQ Monsoon Trough (2019)

Event specific State Recovery Plan was released on 3 September 2019. The first quarterly progress report has been completed.

Central Queensland Bushfires (2018)

Second progress report on recovery has been completed. The reporting process has enabled QRA to support council overcome challenges to develop relationship to facilitate community recovery.

Recovery Planning and Governance Project

As a result of the 2018-19 disaster season, assisting local governments with developing and/or strengthening local disaster recovery capabilities has been identified as a key recovery priority for Queensland.

District Recovery Alignment Project

QRA commenced the District Alignment Project in October 2019. The project will identify how recovery is managed in each Disaster District with reference to the five lines of recovery and any capability gaps through engagement with selected District Disaster Management Groups.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



QRA launched its third annual Get Ready Queensland (GRQ) Week in October 2019, and proved the annual event gets bigger and better every year!

GRQ Week 2019 kicked off on Sunday 13 October at Moreton Bay Regional Council's Emergency Services Expo, which attracted more than 3,000 visitors from the community of Bribie Island.

The official media launch for the week took place on Monday 14 October at King George Square in partnership with GRQ ambassador Johnathan Thurston and 17 partnering organisations including the Bureau of Meteorology, Queensland Fire and Emergency Services, Red Cross, Lifeline, RSPCA and more.

The launch day attracted excellent media coverage which reached more than 1.3 million people nationally. The team continued the week with activities each day including an event on Speaker's Green at Parliament House; a visit to Wynnum State School with Channel Seven's Tony Auden; a Community Recovery Forum hosted by the Department of Communities, Disability Services and Seniors; and a visit to Berrinba East State School with Minister Cameron Dick to wrap up the week.

Following Get Ready Queensland Week, the team was back out on the road talking with North West Queensland locals about how they prepare for severe weather and disasters.

Over two days, the team met with councils and presented to schools in Richmond, McKinlay, Cloncurry and Mt Isa. The trip was a great opportunity for the team to get a better understanding of regional communities and their needs heading into disaster season.



RESILIENCE

QRA leads disaster resilience and mitigation policy in Queensland.

Resilience grant programs

Queensland Disaster Resilience Fund (QDRF) and Prepared Communities Fund

\$10.65M allocated to 73 projects for the 2018-19 round of the State-funded QDRF (\$9.5M, 62 projects) and State-Commonwealth Prepared Communities Fund (\$1.15M, 11 projects). Applications for the 2019-20 allocation of QDRF funding are expected to open in early 2020.

Get Ready Queensland (GRQ)

GRQ provides Queensland Government funding for grants and community awareness campaigns to help local governments improve their communities' resilience.

GRQ's annual preparedness advertising campaign launched on 13 October 2019 and will continue through November. Following delivery of the Line of Fire bushfire awareness campaign in partnership with Queensland Fire & Emergency Services, market research will now be undertaken to assist in planning future GRQ advertising campaigns.

The new Get Ready Queensland website is now live at getready.qld.gov.au. with refreshed branding, updated factsheets and resources, a council hub, social feeds and a news page.

Resilience projects and activities

Resilient Queensland 2018-2021: Delivering the Queensland Strategy for Disaster Resilience

- Three pilot projects are underway to develop regional resilience strategies in Central West Queensland, Mary River and Fitzroy catchments. All three pilots are expected to be completed and launch early 2020
- Evaluation and planning for statewide rollout is underway and expected to ramp up in early 2020.

Flood Mapping and Flood Warning Programs

- Burdekin & Haughton Catchment Resilience Strategy Project – procurement underway; commence January 2020
- Queensland Flood Warning Infrastructure Network Program – 4 areas of operation in Far North, Central West, North West Queensland and Townsville/surrounds. Procurement currently being finalised for delivery of Network Optimisation Phase in Q1 2020.
- Townsville Recalibrated Flood Modelling and Mapping Project - supporting Townsville City Council to update and recalibrate flood modelling and mapping across the council area including the Ross River.

Resilience policy

• QRA is working with CSIRO to develop an adaptation of their Resilience, Adaptation Pathways and Transformation Approach (RAPTA) for Queensland to support state agency resilience building activities.

Brisbane River Strategic Floodplain Management Plan (SFMP)

- QRA has oversight of 52 SFMP actions including 34 for state government and 12 which QRA is responsible for.
- The Brisbane River SFMP Steering Committee met on 29 October with representation from the CEOs of Brisbane, Ipswich, Somerset and Lockyer Valley councils and relevant state agencies.
